INTRODUCTION



Crouch Neighbourhood Resource Centre (Crouch) works to build a healthy community where everyone belongs and can access resources with dignity. Our organization has a 50-year history of community development and food security initiatives within the neighbourhood surrounding the London, Ontario, main street of Hamilton Road. In 2024, more than 3,694 residents accessed programs and services through Crouch.

MISSION

To build a healthy community where everyone belongs and can access resources with dignity.

VISION

A thriving community where everyone reaches their potential.

VALUES

Accountability: We manage resources with transparency, efficiency, and care.

Compassion: We meet community members where they are at and walk with them on their journey to meet their goals

Dignity: We recognize the right of all residents to live in dignity and to participate fully in society. Our interactions with community members and collaborators are centred on the right of each person to be valued and respected for their own sake.

Creativity: We evolve along with the needs and dreams of our community

Collaboration: We work closely with residents and partners to achieve strong outcomes for the community we serve.

Equity: We provide services in a way that honours the diverse lived experiences, talents, and needs of each resident. We address equity gaps by providing basic needs supports that allow residents to focus on other pressing challenges and opportunities.

A YEAR IN REVIEW

The Heart of the Shift - when things changed, so did we — together and stronger.

2024 challenged us in ways we couldn't predict. But at the core of every pivot and every setback was something deeper: our hearts, Crouch's Heart — our people, our mission, our community. We remain deeply inspired by the resilience and strength of our community. The dedication of residents, staff, volunteers, donors, and partner organizations has ensured Crouch remains a vital hub in the Hamilton Road neighbourhood.

This year's AGM is not just a reflection of what changed, but a celebration of how we changed — together and stronger moving forward together and stronger.

Despite a \$120,000 reduction in core annual funding beginning in 2024, our team adapted, shifted priorities quickly, all while proudly supporting 3,694 unique individuals through a broad range of our impactful programs.

Food insecurity remained a pressing and top priority issue. Last year we distributed nearly 61,000 food items through over 6,500 visits to our Food Cupboard and staff also supporting the weekly Mobile Food Bank Truck visits. Thanks to our partners, our seasonal Green Thumbs Garden Program and our Pop-Up Fresh Produce Market brought fresh greens to individuals and families. And lets not forget our furry friends, thanks to monthly donations of pet food from No Empty Bowls Program, through the Humane Society.

Securing and stretching every existing and new dollar was essential. We were thrilled to welcome a new community partner, Dough Boys Pizza, to the Crouch family. They generously stepped up to offset the cost of our monthly hot lunch by donating and serving a pizza meal to over 80 residents each month — a tradition they proudly continue.

Our Winter Warmth Program provided coats, boots, and 100 warming kits to 539 adults and 96 children—offering both warmth and dignity. Priority was given to individuals living rough and to children in our neighbourhood. In partnership with 519 Pursuit, we also distributed over 6,100 pairs of socks—an increase of 50% compared to last year!

Our Tax Volunteers made a significant impact, hosting 3 weekly income tax clinics over a two month period in addition to some volunteers supporting 7 additional sites and organizations. Together, this dedicated crew, completed over 3,300 tax returns for low-income residents, connecting them to essential financial supports and securing over \$16,000 through the CRA CVITP Grant Program.

New funding from Ontario Trillium Foundation extended a life line in reigniting a new Volunteer Engagement Program - priorities shifted quickly and a new Volunteer Resource Program was developed and recuitment underway for volunteer positions in the fall.

Over 150 applications were received, with at least 30 applications submitted for each position. Following the screening, approximately 40 applicants were interviewed in December. 20 volunteers were selected, representing all positions. New recruits were ready to step in where extra human hands and hearts were needed! We continue to grow this new Crouch team into 2025.

Programs like Cards and Games Group and the Women's Art Club fostered connection, creativity, and emotional support on a weekly basis inspite of funding running low. We carried on and carried through with some minor shifts!

Participation in our after-school and summer camp programs grew, enriching the lives of many children and their families. We lost significant funding for our Child & Youth Program in 2024 - we were left a little bruised and battered, but like a resiliant child, we jumped up, brushed ourselves off and hit the ground running!

Community spirit shone at events like our Summer Block Party and Fall Harvest Fest, which brought together nearly 800 residents of all ages.

A national postal strike tried to take down our 2nd annual Direct Mail and Holiday Campaign however we persevered and raised nearly \$10,000, proving again that the generosity of our neighbours knows no bounds. Speaking of generous neighbours, one in particular made a significant difference this year. Their thoughtful and timely gifts to our Food Cupboard helped carry us through some of our most challenging moments. Always checking in, always asking where they could help next—their quiet generosity has been a true lifeline.

Crouch's story is still being written — by every child, every neighbour, every volunteer, staff member, and supporter. Every setback and every win shapes the Heart — the Crouch Teal Heart — helping it grow and shift. This organization, hand in hand with its community, is ready for whatever comes next. Stronger. Together.

CORE SERVICES



NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT SERVICES BASIC NEEDS AND ADVOCACY

Crouch Neighbourhood Resource Centre (Crouch NRC) supports residents who are experiencing the effects of poverty by meeting basic needs and by increasing income stability through access to social benefits. Providing for immediate basic needs such as food, clothing, hygiene and baby items and doing so in ways that convey our respect, value, dignity, and care for all community members not only bridges urgent gaps but helps to develop relationships and social networks.

The goal of the program is to empower residents so that they are in a position to increase their housing and income stability and move themselves out of poverty - a challenge that first requires that their basic needs are met.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Crouch Neighbourhood Resource Centre (NRC) uses a holistic, community focused approach to its work that is grounded in the principles of empowerment, inclusion, justice, self determination, and collective action. Working with residents, local organizations, and partners, Crouch NRC ensures that, across the neighbourhood, residents and groups have opportunities to 'know and be known', to engage and participate in local initiatives and to ensure that the programs and services provided are responsive to local wants and needs.

CHILD AND YOUTH PROGRAMMING


Crouch Neighbourhood Resource Centre plays an important role in extending low-barrier, supportive, and safe recreational opportunities to children, youth, and families. They meet participants where they are at and take the time to identify and develop their unique talents and interests. Through this program, children, youth, and families living in the Hamilton Road and area neighbourhood are supported with equitable access to recreational programming that develops skills, increases self-esteem, and builds social capital.

During the school year, Crouch operates a daily, no-fee afterschool program. In July and August, the Crouch "Summer Splash" day camp operates 5 days a week, emphasizing physical activity, gardening, hygiene and health, emotional and social regulation, and nutritional equity.

Women's Art Wellness Group

Despite experiencing homelessness, Tanya finds stability and hope in the Women's Art Group at Crouch NRC, in partnership with CMHA. Even after losing her apartment to a fire, she remains committed to the weekly sessions, traveling an hour each way. For her, the group is a vital safe space, offering solace and creative expression during difficult times, highlighting the power of community support.

Empowering Inclusion for a Non-Verbal Child with Autism

In 2024, our Summer Splash Camp welcomed Lily, a non-verbal girl with autism, whose parents longed for her to experience summer camp like her brother. They worried about communication, sensory challenges, and social engagement, but with a dedicated inclusion worker, Emily, we created a personalized plan to support her.

Initially, Lily struggled with the new environment, but with sensory-friendly activities, quiet spaces, and patient guidance, she grew more engaged and independent. By summer's end, her smiles, laughter, and newfound connections spoke volumes. Her family was overjoyed to see her thrive in a space where she was truly understood and included.

Lily's journey is a testament to the power of inclusion—where every child, regardless of ability, can belong and shine.

Crouch Child & Youth Services plays a vital role in creating lasting, positive change in the lives of children and youth along Hamilton Road. 



Looking Ahead to 2025

As we step into 2025, we recognize that the funding landscape for not-for-profits continues to be challenging. Navigating these realities requires not only resilience but also creativity, adaptability, and a deep commitment to collaboration.

We are fortunate to have secured new funding from TD Canada Group – Ready Commitment Grant, which will allow us to enhance and rebuild several cornerstone programs at Crouch, including our Wellness Tables: Women's Art Group, Cards & Games, and our much-loved Hot Meal Bonds & Bites program. This investment is a testament to the value of these programs in building community connection, reducing isolation, and supporting overall well-being.

Looking ahead, we will continue to strengthen and grow new partnerships and community relationships, actively seeking ways to collaborate with like-minded organizations. By working together, we can maximize the impact of every dollar and ensure essential services remain accessible to our neighbourhood, particularly as we welcome our new neighbours from the ever-expanding SOHO Vision development over the next few years.

We remain diligent in exploring and seeking out grant opportunities to sustain our existing programs and to bring new initiatives to life. We are excited to share that the Westminster College Foundation will fund two dedicated Inclusion Workers for our Summer Splash Day Camp. These staff will provide critical one-on-one and small group support, enabling children who require additional assistance to fully participate and thrive in our camp experience—ensuring our programs remain inclusive and welcoming for all.

At the heart of our vision for 2025 is the continued development of our human resource team, investing in both our staff and our growing volunteer base to better meet the increasing needs of our residents. Together, we are building a team ready to rise to the challenges ahead and committed to delivering the programs and support that our community counts on.

In addition, we will begin the process of developing our new 2026-2028 Strategic Plan. This will be a community-driven roadmap that will help us set priorities, strengthen our mission, and position Crouch to thrive in the years ahead.

We move forward with optimism, determination, and the firm belief that we are stronger together.
